

Subject: "When all seems lost"

Reading: Matthew 11:1-11

- Mistreatment will occur when you are committed to following Christ; count on it! (John 16:33; 2 Timothy 3:10-12; James 1:2-4; 1 Peter 2:20-21; 3:14.
- 2. Mistreatment did occur; John was a classic example (Matthew 6:14-20).
- 3. When all seems lost; the problem of doubt (Matthew 11:1-3):
 - (a) John was depressed by his narrow circumstance.
 - (b) John was disappointed by no sign of his release.
 - (c) John's view of Christ was partial. He preached of a wheat gathering, chaff burning Messiah and the Lord Jesus didn't seem to fit the picture with all his gentle good works.
- 4. The Lord's answer to John's doubt (verse 4-6)
 - (a) The answer was indirect; it answered John's heart as well as John's intellect.
 - (b) The answer was mysterious; it was the divine husbandman pruning his vine for the best results.
 - (c) The answer was sufficient; he sent John back to the Scriptures.
 - (d) The answer gave what has become the forgotten beatitude; "Blessed is he who is not offended because of me"
- 5. The Lord's assessment of John (verse 7-11):
 - (a) The timing of his assessment; heaven does not judge by a passing mood (verse 7).
 - (b) His summary of John's characteristics; John's independence (verse 7), his simplicity (verse 8), his noble office (verse 10).
 - (c) His reservation; the least instructed in the kingdom of heaven is privileged to see and hear the things that the prophet John waited and longed for.
